



SereniScalp Head Spa Table Cleaning Instructions

1. Required After-Each-Client Cleaning (Per Cosmetology Sanitation Standards)

1. Remove all visible debris

- Clear hair, product residue, and any foreign material from the basin and drain area.

2. Wash with Soap and Water

- Use warm water and a mild, non-abrasive soap.
- Wipe interior surfaces with a soft cloth or non-scratch sponge.

3. Rinse Thoroughly

- Ensure no soap film remains, as residue can interfere with disinfectants.

4. Disinfect Using an EPA-Registered Salon Disinfectant

- Must be **EPA-registered**, clearly labeled as **bactericidal, virucidal, and fungicidal**.
- Must be **approved for use on plastic/acrylic surfaces**.
- Apply disinfectant per manufacturer instructions and **respect required dwell/contact time**.

5. Final Rinse (if required by the disinfectant instructions)

- Some disinfectants are “no-rinse,” others require a water flush.
- Follow the product-specific instructions to remain code compliant.

6. Dry With a Clean, Single-Use Towel or Clean-Laundered Towel

- Required to prevent microbial growth and spotting.

2. End-of-Day Sanitation (Cosmetology Code Standard)

1. **Deep-clean the basin** with warm water and a mild, acrylic-safe cleaner.
2. **Disinfect the entire basin, faucet, sprayer, headrest, and surrounding surfaces** with an EPA-registered disinfectant.

3. **Clean the drain area:**

- Remove hair traps/screens (if detachable), clean and disinfect.
- Flush with warm water.

4. **Dry completely** with a clean towel.

5. **Store cleaning chemicals separately** from client-use products per typical state board regulations.

3. Acrylic-Specific Safety (Compatible With State Code Restrictions)

Most cosmetology codes prohibit cleaners that can damage equipment or create hazardous fumes.

Do NOT use:

- Bleach or chlorine-based products (unless local code specifically requires diluted bleach; check state regs)
- Ammonia-based glass cleaners
- Acetone or solvent cleaners
- Highly alkaline or acidic products
- Abrasive scrubbing powders or pads
- High-temperature steam directed at acrylic surfaces

These can cause cracking, clouding, or surface degradation that violates equipment-maintenance requirements.

4. Plumbing & Drain Compliance

- **Hair traps/screens must be kept clean** to maintain sanitary drainage, as required in most salon plumbing/hygiene codes.
 - **No caustic drain cleaners** (such as lye-based openers) these are typically prohibited for acrylic and can conflict with environmental discharge rules.
 - Only use **enzyme-based or acrylic-safe drain maintenance products**.
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5. Upholstered Table Sections (If Used as Part of HeadSpa Service)

Cosmetology rules require that all client-contact surfaces be cleaned and disinfected between clients.

1. Wipe the vinyl upholstery with mild soap and water.
 2. Disinfect with a **vinyl-safe EPA-registered disinfectant**.
 3. Do not use straight alcohol, citrus cleaners, or abrasive pads (most state boards prohibit cleaners that degrade equipment surfaces).
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6. Weekly Maintenance (Recommended for Code Compliance & Longevity)

- Fill the tub partially with warm water and an acrylic-safe cleaning solution.
 - Let sit for 5–10 minutes to break down hidden residue.
 - Drain and fully disinfect afterward.
 - Apply an acrylic-safe polish (optional) to maintain clarity.
 - Inspect plumbing fittings, sprayer, and drain components for buildup or obstruction.
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7. Additional Code-Related Requirements

To comply with salon regulations:

- **Keep a clearly labeled disinfectant at the station** (most states require disinfectants accessible to staff).
- **Maintain Safety Data Sheets (SDS)** for all cleaners and disinfectants on-site.
- **Use only single-use towels for drying**, or properly laundered towels stored in a closed cabinet.
- **No storing personal items or unrelated equipment in or around the basin**, which is prohibited under many codes.
- **If used for multi-purpose tasks**, the basin must be cleaned and disinfected between each use.

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
